Workbook for Members of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers)



Notes for Parents, Spiritual Advisors, and Scouters:

This workbook is intended to support Quaker Scouts in learning more about the history, faith, and practice of the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers) through The Scout Association's Faith activity badge.

- 1) Youth who are members or attenders of the Religious Society of Friends and are involved in Scouting should be encouraged to earn this badge.
- 2) Consider making arrangements for the Faith Activity Badge to be presented to the Scout upon completion at a regular session of the Meeting for Worship. The Scout's Scout Group or a representative of the group should be invited to attend the presentation whenever possible.

Take an active part in your place of worship. You could get involved in community work, take a special part in services or celebrations or follow a training or study programme.

Reflections for Parents/Spiritual Advisor/Scouter:
Come regularly to meeting for worship even when you are angry, depressed, tired, or spiritually cold. In the silence, ask for and accept the prayerful support of others joined with you in worship" (Advices & Queries #10)

Do not be content to accept things as they are, but keep an alert and questioning mind. Seek to discover the causes of social unrest, injustice, and fear; try to discern the new growing-points in social and economic life.
